The Protective Factors: Knowledge of Parenting & Child Development

The Protective Factors are strengths all families may have and can build upon that support resilient, thriving children and families. They are: parental resilience, social connections, knowledge of parenting & child development, concrete support in times of need, social & emotional competence of children, and nurturing & attachment.

These factors help to reduce stress, enhance wellbeing and positive parent-child relationships that are the foundation for healthy development in children. This month, our focus is on **Knowledge of Parenting and Child Development.** When we have an idea of what to expect as our children grow, we can respond to their needs in developmentally appropriate ways, support their growth, and having a strong bond with our children.

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Children have reasons for behaving the way they do. Sometimes it can be hard to understand them, but if we can ask ourselves why our child might be acting a certain way before we react, we can try to understand the feelings and needs that are <u>underlying</u> the behaviors we see. This will help us respond with empathy and get to the root of what our child is trying to tell us through their behaviors. We won't always do this perfectly and that's okay. The goal is to learn about your child's unique personality, strengths, and needs, which are ever-changing as they grow and develop. Adapting to new stages or parenting while dealing with other forms of stress can be very challenging, but remember -you know your child best, and you can choose what works best for your children and your family. You've got this! Below are some activities you may do at home to support your child's language development. We'll share activities that support the different developmental domains each time we revisit this protective factor.

Developmentally Appropriate Activities: Language

0-6 months

It's never too early to start reading with our infants while holding them or during tummy time! Start with board or fabric books; point out and describe the images in the books as your baby takes it all in.

2-3 years

Put objects into a bucket. Let your child remove them one at a time and say its name. Repeat what they say and add to it. Help them group the objects into categories, like clothes, food, and animals.

6-12 months

Teach your baby to imitate actions like peek-a-boo, clapping, blowing kisses, and waving bye-bye. This teaches them how to take turns. We take turns when we talk.

3-4 years

Read books with a simple story. Talk about the story with your child. Help your child retell the story or act it out with props and dress-up clothes. Tell them your favorite part of the story and ask them what theirs was.

1-2 years

Read to your child every day. Try to find books with large pictures and a few words on each page. Talk about the pictures on each page.

4-6 years

Have your child help you plan daily activities. For example, have them make a shopping list for the grocery store, or let them help you plan their birthday party. Ask their opinion and let them make choices.


